An Introduction to Lent

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. The English word *Lent* comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *lencten*, which means *lengthen* and refers to the lengthening days of spring. In many other languages, the word used for this season refers to the 40-day length of the season (*cuaresma* in Spanish, *carême* in French, *quaresima* in Italian) or to the fasting that characterizes it (*Fastenzeit* in German, *fastan* in Swedish, *paasto* in Finnish).

Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians. The first Sunday of Lent describes Jesus' temptation by Satan; and the sixth Sunday (Palm Sunday), Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem and his subsequent passion and death. Note that the readings during Lent, until Palm Sunday, focus primarily on the meaning of baptism and discipleship, in continuity with the season's original purpose. Because Sundays are always little Easters, the penitential spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful expectation of the Resurrection.

Week 3 | Mercy

During Lent, we have traditionally asked Christians to focus on the *seven acts* of mercy during Lent. These are: to feed the hungry, to give water to the thirsty, to clothe the naked, to shelter the homeless, to visit those in prison, and to comfort the bereaved and afflicted. These are, of course, based on the teaching of Jesus in St Matthew 25. They paint a picture of Christians going outwards to serve the wider community.

During the past ten years, Pope Francis has put mercy at the centre of his vision for the Church. Rather than being seen as judgmental or inflexible, the Pope wants Christians to be known for our compassionate love for others. He writes, 'God's mercy can make even the driest land become a garden, can restore life to dry bones (Ezekiel 37.1-14) ... Let us be renewed by God's mercy, let us be loved by Jesus, let us enable the power of his love to transform our lives too, and let us become agents of this mercy, channels through which God can water the earth, protect all creation, and make justice and peace flourish.'

Pope Francis is surely correct. In our broken world, the gift of kindness may seem so weak and insignificant, but it is gentle mercy that opens our hearts to God.

Sunday March 12th *Third Sunday of Lent*

Reading

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ!
